Workshop Description

Learn how to print your own t-shirts and fine art screen-prints! Students will learn about the history of screen-printing from Ancient China to pop artists like Andy Warhol. Students will make their very own screens from which they can make their own prints.

By watching the instructor demonstrate how to create a screen for printing, students will be engaged in active listening and carrying out a series of steps for a finished product. Students will also participate in a brief critique and discussion of peer's projects using VTS (visual thinking strategies) to analyze their work.

Vocabulary

Printmaking: The process of making artworks by printing. Printmaking covers only the process of creating prints that have an element of originality, rather that just being a photographic reproduction of a painting.

Screen-printing: A printing technique that uses woven mesh to support an ink-blocking stencil to receive desired image.

Serigraphy: A combination of the Latin word for "silk", seri, and the Greek word for "to write", graphos. This ancient method of duplicating an original painting is one of the oldest forms of printing.

- 1. Visit a library or museum and explore a variety of prints. Look for different textures in the prints.
- 2. Explore patterns and techniques created by other artists. How do their styles reflect their culture, environment, and traditions?
